VATICAN HOSTS SYMPOSIUM AGAINST HUMAN TRAFFICKING—RENA TE DELEGATES PRESENT



The photograph shows six RENATE delegates who recently attended the International Youth Symposium in the Vatican, 15-16 November, 2014. The Symposium was organised jointly by the Pontifical Academy of Sciences, the inter-faith Global Freedom Network (GFN) and the Argentinian anti-trafficking association 'Viniculos En Red,' and saw young women and men involved in the fight against human trafficking making their voices heard on how best to prevent human trafficking and support the victims of this global trade in persons. Speakers, including young survivors of trafficking and sexual exploitation, who courageously shared their experiences and hopes, in order to draw up some practical strategies for combatting this sin against humanity.

By collaborating together, these three organisations have used their capabilities, experiences and networks to identify young people throughout the globe, to go to the Vatican and share their stories with the anti-trafficking movement to develop broader and far-reaching strategies that will have a positive impact on the eradication of this modern-day slavery.

The following quotation gives us an insight into the impact of the Symposium:

"I cannot even begin to put into words the experience I had over the weekend. It was truly life-changing, an incredible few days where I was exposed to the most inspiring young people. Hearing other peoples' stories, all at different stages in their journey, really filled me with hope, hope that we will do something to stop this crime."

It is planned that all who attended the symposium, will become a reference group with whom the GFN can continually consult and therefore, be better informed in its work with others to eradicate human slavery.



THE GLOBAL MODERN SLAVERY DIRECTORY...

a collaborative effort to map individuals/organisations working on modern slavery issues. The goal is to create a **resource**, used to connect with a range of actors who are tackling modern slavery globally. It includes NGOs (non-government organisations), multilateral institutions, government agencies, and law enforcement agencies. Already over 120 countries have shared information and agreed to be a part of the Directory. RENATE submitted details to be listed in the Directory.

OXFORD UNIVERSITY STUDENTS CAMPAIGN—JUST LOVE—AGAINST HUMAN TRAFFICKING

JUST LOVE is a new organisation founded by Oxford University students, who recently held an anti-slavery protest in Oxford.

Hannah Coates, organiser of **JUST LOVE** campaign commented "The more people who know about trafficking, the better equipped we will be to protect victims and combat it." In early October 2014, the campaign marked the EU Anti-Trafficking Day with a large flash-mob march through Oxford City Centre. All the participants wore black tee-shirts and duct tape handcuffs. The flash-mob walked in silence to the beat of a drum in order to raise awareness of the issue.

JUST LOVE also co-operates with the *Oxford Community against Trafficking* (OXCAT), a local community group founded in the wake of the discovery of an Oxford trafficking ring in 2014.

It was agreed that trafficking in human beings occurs *'under our very noses'* throughout the European Union and is a criminal activity of huge complexity. There was a shared view that efforts made to address the matter of human trafficking to date have fallen short. Sr. Eugenia Bonetti was most passionate about the inadequacy of provision. She drew from her life-time of experiences working with victims of human trafficking and called upon those present to collaborate more effectively so that we will become a powerful force working against this crime against humanity. The Catholic Church is an active partner in the fight against this distressing phenomenon, but needs to do more. Dialogue Seminars take place usually twice a year. They are co-organised by the BEPA (Bureau of European Policy Advisors of the European Commission) together with COMECE and the Church & Society Commission of the Conference of European Churches (CEC).

**INTERNATIONAL DECLARATION OF YOUNG PEOPLE
AGAINST PROSTITUTION AND TRAFFICKING**

**POPE FRANCIS TO THE YOUTH OF
RIO—28TH WORLD YOUTH DAY,
25 JULY 2013**

"I hope there will be noise. Here there will be noise, I'm quite sure. Here in Rio there will be plenty of noise, no doubt about that. But I want you to make yourselves heard in your diocese, I want the noise to go out, I want the Church to go out onto the streets, I want us to resist everything globally, everything static, everything comfortable, everything to do with clericalism, everything that might make us closed in on ourselves." These words of Pope Francis have accompanied, guided and touched the hearts of the youth who took part in the Vatican Youth Symposium, 2014 and who are engaged in action for diverse social and political causes.

"WE, YOUNG PEOPLE from different countries, have mobilized ourselves to have our voices heard in condemnation of the system that has allowed people to fall into prostitution and any other type of slavery, and we have mobilized ourselves as active defenders of Human Rights, promoters for the protection of fundamental Human Rights and (some) as survivors of Human Trafficking.

WE, AS HUMAN BEINGS, are not objects that can be commercialized. We have rights and duties, and we want to exercise them on a stage of equal opportunities. We condemn slavery because it brings about crimes against humanity and the dignity of human beings.

WE ARE IN SOLIDARITY with those who have been and are still victims. From here we will begin to send our message to the world, calling all young people together to break the cultural paradigms that condemn people to all kinds of exploitation.

We shall not relent, we shall unite and organize ourselves, because we are convinced that by taking into account the task that each young person carries out in his or her country, by renewing our hope through this Symposium, which has been a guiding light on our path, by reaffirming our commitment to empower citizens who have become vulnerable, by listening to them and helping them we are convinced that we will be able to keep them.../ *continued.*



DECLARATION OF YOUNG PEOPLE *CONTINUED*

Vatican Youth Symposium 18 November, 2014

...falling prisoner to the network of Prostitution and Human Trafficking.

WE, THE YOUNG PEOPLE, DECLARE THAT:

- **the State must implement** training programmes for different types of public employees and must make people who work in both justice and security aware (of these issues)

- **the State must protect** the Human Rights and must provide all necessary assistance to the victims of Prostitution and Human Trafficking

- **it is fundamental that States provide** the economic means to prevent and fight against Prostitution and Human - Trafficking in a concrete and effective way.

- **the creation of an observatory and/or an alert system** is necessary to demonstrate the normalisation of violence against women which originates from the over-eroticism of violence and its orientation towards women in the media.

Education is a means of social and cultural transformation. For this reason creating training campaigns for teachers and professionals is of fundamental importance for giving them the tools to provide young people with an adequate knowledge of sex, because sex covers a wide and complex field, of which they are ignorant. It is this lack of knowledge that provides exploiters with one of their modes of control. Another core objective of education is to make sure that young men do not purchase sex, because this makes these same men part of the objectification of human beings and the merchandising of their bodies.

- **it is of primordial importance to create safe spaces** for women who are at risk and to create spaces where they will find adequate support and that these spaces respect the individual progress of every woman.

- **it is essential to criminalise** those who purchase sex and criminalise human trafficking in all its forms. Due to the acceptance of human trafficking, in whatever form it might take, it has become possible for traffickers to exploit human beings. We should not condemn victims, but condemn the chain of exploitation in its entirety.

- **we should urge States, Institutions, civil society** and all citizens of the world to promise to continue investigating and fighting Human Trafficking.


We, the young, maintain the premise that all men and women of the world are equals and are free, and we maintain that we must join forces to rescue and empower those who have been victims of Trafficking or any other type of slavery and join forces to restore their human rights.”

RENA TE COLLABORATES WITH CARITAS SLOVAKIA IN AN AWARENESS-RAISING PROJECT

As an awareness raising measure, *Caritas Slovakia* supported the screening of a series of short films previously produced for the *Unchosen Film Competition* 2013, which highlight the various types of modern day slavery.

Screenings, followed by a panel discussion with question/answer session, took place at the October Film Festival in Bratislava and was repeated in the Slovak Embassy, London, where the *Together Against Trafficking* organised a Film event.

It was agreed that films are a powerful tool to heightened awareness and promote dialogue, particularly among young people who may not be aware of the ease with which one can become trapped in a trafficking snare.



2ND DECEMBER—UN DAY FOR THE ABOLITION OF SLAVERY

Following the launch in March 2013, of the faith-based Global Freedom Network, including the Vatican, Al-Azhar University and the Anglican Communion, Pope Francis with leaders of other churches and religions, signed a declaration on the 2nd of December - the U.N. day for the Abolition of Slavery-pledging to work together to help end modern day slavery in the world by 2020.

The 2nd of December marks the date of the adoption by the UN General Assembly of the Convention for the Suppression of the Traffic in Persons and of the Exploitation of the Prostitution of Others (Resolution 317 (iv)) of the 2nd December, 1949.

The focus of this day is on eradicating contemporary forms of slavery, such as trafficking in persons, sexual exploitation, the worst forms of child labour, forced marriage, and the forced recruitment of children for use in armed conflict.



POPE FRANCIS URGED GOVERNMENTS, BUSINESSES AND ALL PEOPLE OF GOOD WILL TO JOIN FORCES AGAINST THIS 'CRIME AGAINST HUMANITY.'

The Pope and eleven leaders representing the Anglican, Buddhist, Hindu, Jewish, Muslim and Orthodox faiths signed the joint declaration at the headquarters of the Pontifical Academy of Sciences in the Vatican gardens today. They were inspired by their religious beliefs and a desire to take practical action and be united by a commitment to eradicate slavery worldwide.

"We pledge ourselves here today to do all in our power, within our faith communities and beyond, to work together for the freedom of all those who are enslaved and trafficked so that their future may be restored," stated the declaration

Victims of trafficking joined in reading the declaration aloud:

"Today we have the opportunity, awareness, wisdom, innovation and technology to achieve this human and moral imperative."

RENATE members in Germany play an active role with the aid and human rights organisation SOLWODI which helps women and girls who have fallen victim to human trafficking, forced prostitution or forced marriage. SOLWODI has commenced a campaign for the prohibition of sex-purchase in Germany, against the trade in women as goods and for equality of men and women.

For more than ten years now, Germany has legalised prostitution. The ensuing outcome is that prostitution is seen as just a job, like any other. In Germany this has had dramatic consequences. There has been a marked increase in the numbers of women forced into prostitution. The living conditions for women in prostitution are worse than ever. Most of the women are exploited, working under pressure or compulsion and working without a contract or safety measures of any kind. Dependency on drug and alcohol consumption is the norm whilst fulfilling their tasks.

Many victims of prostitution suffer from post-traumatic stress disorders similar to those of torture victims and most victims would quit what they do, if they could.

SOLWODI judges that prostitution supports trafficking in human beings and is a fundamental attack on the dignity of the human person and on human rights. In many instances, prostitution supports racism, prevents gender equality, increases violence and is a source of violence.





TRUST WOMEN'S CONFERENCE IN LONDON



Sister Imelda Poole IBVM represented RENATE as a speaker and member of the discussion panel, at the *trust women* conference. Delegates from 260 organisations representing over 55 countries took place in this year's conference held in London in November, 2014. Many media people were at the event and *trust women* received news coverage from more than 50 international media outlets including BBC, The Guardian, ITV, CNN, Le Monde, The Globe and Mail, Estado de Sao Paulo, Corriere della Sera, and Grazia. This year's conference has been the biggest so far with over 550 people participating in the event. In the social media, *trust women* dominated the conversation with the

hashtag [#twc2014](#) trending in London on both days of the conference!

[@TrustWomenConf](#) received over 24.4million impressions. A warm welcome was given when Humanity United CEO Randy Newcomb, announced that Pierre and Pam Omidyar are to donate an extra \$50 million to tackling slavery worldwide. Barry Koch, Chief Compliance Officer at *Western Union* proposed to set up with the Thomson Reuters Foundation, a European financial working group on the model already launched by the Thomson Reuters Foundation and the Office of the Manhattan District Attorney in the USA. The initiative will bring together Europe's biggest financial institutions and organisations such as Europol or Interpol to identify suspicious financial transactions and share data with prosecutors. On the *trust women* website it is possible to listen to many of the events on live stream. The pictures are for all to see and the topics covered, range from Safety in the City for women, child labour trafficking, particularly in India and other Asian countries, and Social businesses as a preventative action. If a woman is economically empowered, it is maintained that her family is better fed and the children go to school. Other topics in the conference included: Trafficking and the supply chain; Traffickers and their use of the internet to ply their trade; how internet experts are tracking their machinations through data bases drawn up on the net.

Imelda focused on the supply chain and trafficking. She called for action against illegal labour agencies often established on the Internet and multiplied according to need and as an avoidance tactic away from the what traffickers regard as the '*preying eyes*' of the police. The penalty for being caught is so low that the crime far outweighs it in profit. When one Internet site is closed down, there is always another set of 'new' agencies begun with different names. Much income is sourced from the vulnerable victims eager for work and for a new life.

TRAINING PROGRAMME FOR RENATE MEMBERS—ROMANIA

A week-long training programme on **Labour Trafficking and Migration** took place in Romania from 2-7 November 2014, funded by the RENATE sponsors.

This was part of RENATE's ongoing commitment to research, skills and information-sharing throughout the Network, in support of its vision to work to end Human Trafficking and exploitation .

Forty members of RENATE - religious and their co-workers - gathered at the Carmelite Monastery Conference and Retreat Centre, Snagov, near Bucharest to learn about the issue as well as to reflect and strengthen the bonds that support the Network.

Sr. Imelda Poole, President of RENATE presented an image of the *Nautilus* during her introductory remarks, as a comparable example of how RENATE continues to evolve. Just as the *Nautilus* continues to grow by means of growing a new shell on the back of previous shells, so too does RENATE develop. Deepening, evolving and building upon the foundations and previous work of others.

Pope Francis opened the *Synod of Bishops on the Family*, 5th October, 2014, Rome, saying:

"...Because we must say everything we feel we need to say, in the spirit of the Lord, without pusillanimity and without fear. At the same time, we must listen humbly and embrace with an open heart what our brothers are telling us...I can ask you please to adopt these two fraternal attitudes, in the name of the Lord: to feel with 'parresia' and listen humbly..."

These words and sentiments describe best the atmosphere and culture which prevailed throughout the *ANDANTE* Conference in Riga, in the days prior to the Synod.

The Conference focused on how the *ANDANTE* member organisations are taking actions to address and combat poverty in their own countries as well as through collaborations with partners in other European countries. More than fifty delegates attended.

European and global perspectives on poverty were discussed, as was the concept of family in modern times. Different approaches to addressing poverty-related matters were presented by representatives of three *ANDANTE* member organisations: Gretta's story from Riga; The UK National Board of Catholic Women, and Mary Ward Loreto with RENATE-Europe. This led to lively discussion exchange of impressions and responses.

Mary Ward Loreto (MWL) and *RENATE* presented their work to combat Human Trafficking. This struck a chord with those present and gave rise to requests for membership of *RENATE*. This is a welcome development!

The situation in the host country Latvia, was presented by Gretta, a survivor who has struggled personally to overcome poverty and now works to help others in similar need. She founded *Martin's House*, which offers shelter and support to homeless mothers. Gretta spoke of the desperate situation for so many unemployed who become homeless due to the downturn in the economy.

The *'National Board of Catholic Women'* in the UK shared some poverty consciousness-raising projects.

Their focus was on social responsibility and the power of working through networks such as *CARITAS*, and *'The Women at the Well'* was much appreciated. The conclusion was that we need more women to be politically engaged, to be vocal and advocates for Catholic Social Teaching.

One of *ANDANTE'S* long-term goals is to seek to be heard in the political arena. It works hard to be respected and regarded as a voice of women at the *Council of Europe*, as well as other political and Church bodies throughout Europe. This is already being achieved as the Conference proceedings will be 'fed into' future meetings of the *Parliamentary Assembly of the Council of Europe* (PACE).

As *ANDANTE* grows and widens its impact, its immediate task is to identify the extent of other Catholic Women's Organisations throughout Europe. A project to achieve this scope is due to begin in 2015.

The British Embassy in Slovakia hosted the launch of the awareness raising campaign film *'Two Little Girls'* on 20th November, 2014. The film tells the story of two young girls who were deceived into trafficking and prostitution. It has been incorporated into an awareness-raising campaign to alert young people to the dangers of travelling abroad, lured by false promises of employment and better opportunities. Members of *RENATE* and *Caritas* Slovakia developed teaching resource materials to accompany the film which will be distributed with a DVD to teachers, Romani mediators, social workers and youth workers in Slovakia.



THE DUTCH FOUNDATION OF RELIGIOUS AGAINST TRAFFICKING IN WOMEN (SRTV), SHARE NEWS OF AN INNOVATIVE PROJECT

The SRTV is one of the partners involved in a newly created Dutch project named *'Safe Return, Safe Future.'*

It is intended to offer foreign women and men, victims of human trafficking who are being cared for in a reception centre, the possibility to return to their own country voluntarily.

Many Dutch 'shelters' work with a programme based on women's own strengths and self-reliance. In this method, a possible return can be part of a plan for the future that is developed together with the women.

Men have been received recently, using this same method.

Safe Return: In this project, a method is being developed that can be used by Social workers in 'shelters' and reception centres.

Several organisations developed the method in Soesterberg, The Netherlands, September, 2014.

The Bulgarian ANIMUS/La STRADA as well as COSUDOW (organisation of Nigerian religious sisters Against human trafficking) were also present.

Voluntary Choice. A woman can only make a good choice for her future if the social workers have a good understanding of the place to which she can return. During the meeting, it became evident that a reliable organisation in the home country must be contacted at a very early stage of reception.

A number of organisations are currently implementing the method, which is evolving.



Delegates from RENAME attended the Symposium in Brussels, on Thursday, 27th November 2014,

where practitioners, senior officials, non-state actors and policy/decision makers at EU, national, regional and local levels in Europe gathered to share best practice, develop and progress multi-agency work and encourage greater political will to properly recognise the needs of all victims of human trafficking.

- 2) Cross-Border Law Enforcement and prosecution of Traffickers.
- 3) Protecting Vulnerable Groups and Raising Awareness; The need for a Victim-Centred approach.
- 4) Improving Cooperation Amongst Key actors at International level.

RENAME had the opportunity to exchange ideas and engage in thought-provoking topical debate as the Symposium presented on the need for Policy development through to current research findings in the topic of human trafficking.
